- Brown, Jenkins, and Smith's law firm
 (When possession is shared by more than one noun, use the possessive form for the last noun in the series. Turn to 473.4.)
- Brown's, Jenkins', and Smith's law firms
 (When possession is individual, make each noun possessive. Turn to 473.4.)
- boss's salary, Kiss's album (When a singular noun ends in s, there are two ways to form the possessive. If the word has one syllable and can be pronounced easily, add an apostrophe and s. Turn to 472.3.)
- Ramses' tomb (The other way is to add only an apostrophe. This is recommended when adding an s to the word would make the pronunciation difficult—Moses's staff or Sophocles's plays. Adding only an apostrophe is preferred for words of more than one syllable. Turn to 472.3.)
